I perform medical record abstraction and confer with colleagues to ensure consensus, assist with manuscript preparation, and most recently supported the technical build and release of the latest version of the Area Deprivation Index (ADI), a tool used frequently by our team, our collaborators, and outside entities nationwide. I also have the freedom to pursue my own projects in order to work towards completing my dissertation. I was able to take a leading role in a medical record abstraction project from its design through its execution and was the primary author on the manuscript recently published from this work. Currently, I am working on my dissertation research which focuses on how exposure to area-based disadvantage over the life course is associated with vascular brain injury found in a brain bank sample.

Responsibilities:

As a study coordinator for the Coordinated Transitional Care (C-TraC) intervention, I identified, recruited, and enrolled older adults with dementia and their family caregivers for this prospective study. I then performed follow-up surveys with the caregivers over the course of 90 days, followed by a medical record abstraction to determine outcomes. I collaborate with other researchers on several projects for our team, including designing and carrying out medical record abstractions, and maintaining online databases. I have also assisted with training undergraduate and medical student interns, and served as their mentor during their time with the team. Finally, I assist with administrative tasks, such as submitting articles written by research team members to peer-reviewed journals, and keeping projects in compliance with the Institutional Review Board.
